



The B9 Ranch conserves 'a beautiful place, with an alright ranch in the middle'

In February, Faith Ingwersen conserved her family's ranch along Soldier Creek. She describes it as "a beautiful place with an alright ranch in the middle." The ranch has been under continuous agriculture production for about a century and is home to many mule deer, pronghorn, and elk.

Faith recalled a childhood on her family ranch just over the hill from Beckton. There were no modern amenities, but there were her sister, Betty, and her mother, Anna. Together, they ran sheep on its hills and meadows until it was time for the girls to go to



high school. "In the summers, we were herding; in the winters, we were learning," she reminisced.

Faith permanently protected her family ranch through a conservation easement with SCLT. "It represents a valuable and intact landscape threatened by development," said Meghan Kent, SCLT Conservation Director. "It is in the foothills area where many properties are being subdivided, and the long-term agricultural use is at risk of being lost."

The Iron Riders ride again this Juneteenth

SCLT is excited to celebrate the legacy of the 25th Infantry Regiment Bicycle Corps - better known as The Iron Riders.

The story of these Buffalo Soldiers had largely been lost to history. Thankfully, citizen and professional researchers took an interest in them.

The men pedaled through Sheridan County on a 1,900-mile journey as part of the U.S. Army's Great Bicycle Experiment. SCLT will preserve this unique history and tell the Iron Riders' story through a new, innovative driving/cycling audio tour, a first of its kind, funded by a \$50,000 African American Cultural

kind, funded by a \$50,000 African American Cultural Heritage Action Fund Grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

The new tour will launch this Juneteenth, June 19, complete with a special celebration featuring Buffalo Soldier reenactors from around the country who will pedal off from the Historic Sheridan Inn.



Conservation

The Place

Sheridan County is a beautiful place with attractive development prices; half of our county is private land. Private land is critical to nourishing our communities, is important habitat for wildlife, and creates the backbone of our sweeping viewsheds, which are woven deeply into our local identity.

The Challenge

Without careful planning, we face a loss of agricultural lands and large connected natural areas as Sheridan County grows. Conventional agriculture often does not create enough return to keep the land as working land, while traditional conservation tools can react slowly.

The 5-Year Plan

Conserve places where wildlife thrive, provide steppingstones of habitat in developed areas and lands of critical conservation or vital agriculture value at high risk of loss, and partner with local groups to connect people to nature nearby. **Funding Goal: \$2,826,747**

Our community is actively engaged in conserving healthy natural areas that provide publicly accessible open spaces near our cities and towns. Working lands are conserved in geographic areas that are consistent with our communities' 25-year growth. Users and regulators balance water use cooperatively.

How SCLT helps now

Stelindo Ranch Conserved with SCLT in

November 2023

The Stelindo Ranch "stitches" divided land together, parcel by parcel, to permanently conserve land for agricultural production and wildlife like mule deer and pronghorn just east of Sheridan. The ranch abuts a tract of state trust land, which keeps an even larger landscape intact. That's



more open space and open views, along with many more mule deer and pronghorn for everyone. Stelindo Ranch owners Steve and Linda Ough have seen more and more ag land and open space in rural communities like ours shrink. Because of that, they chose SCLT as a partner to permanently conserve their patch of paradise because they knew SCLT was a trusted local partner.

The Place

Sheridan County has a deep history of nomadic hunters, gatherers, and immigrants that continues through the people who make us a thriving community today. Livelihoods like logging, polo, art, mining, and ranching remain culturally important.

The Challenge

Without planning and preservation, the stories and perspectives of our people and their connections to the landscape are lost to disrepair, development, and time. Conventional preservation tools can be slow to react, while financial incentives are few.



The 5-Year Plan

Permanently preserve and/or interpret significant historic structures and sites representing our county's character and economy. Develop and present educational activities that connect people to land and history.

Funding Goal: \$1,532,940

How SCLT helps now

Stephen George Homestead

Added to the National Register of Historic Places in Spring 2023

Tom Balding knew that his home along Prairie Dog Creek had historical value of some kind, but he never knew how historic it truly was. By partnering with SCLT, Tom learned that his homesite was part of the Bozeman Trail route



in 1864-65. Before that, it was likely utilized by Plains Indian Tribes since it sits along a reliable water source. When Stephen George built his cabin on the site in 1881, there were only two other homes in what would soon be Sheridan. Bricks for the house were baked on-site. The barn's stones contain many fossils that date back as far as 360 million years. In 2023, the Stephen George Homestead was added to the National Register for Historic Places. "Getting listed wouldn't have happened without SCLT. They did an amazing job," Tom concluded.

Recreation

The Place

Sheridan County has limited accessible, non-motorized recreation options that extend from our communities to our surrounding landscape and are available to all abilities.

The Threat

As our communities develop, the opportunity to create recreation spaces and trails that connect existing trails becomes more challenging to achieve.



The 5-Year Plan

Develop recreation opportunities that include trails, paved pathways, and access points that further local priorities while elevating opportunities that combine recreation with conservation and/or history.

Funding Goal: \$2,737,541

When Suzanne Beaudelaire asked why it had been 45 years since she had backpacked into the backcountry, she simply said, "Life got in the way." Thankfully, our beautiful Bighorns backyard has been in view. Once retired, she determined she would get into the mountains to take in this serene space. An injury delayed her plans, so she resolved to train - and found a perfect training ground in SCLT's community trails. Hidden Hoot and Red Grade Trails were fun ways to get in quick hikes as we worked up range and elevation; an 8-mile out-and-back at Soldier Ridge Trail fully packed confirmed she was ready. Then, it was a trip to the Seven



Brothers Lakes in the Cloud Peak Wilderness. Her assessment of the trip: "Unbeatable!" Because of SCLT community trails, Suzanne could connect with the land in way she hadn't for 45 years!

Have you ever been exploring our beautiful Bighorns backyard and came across a bird, a bug, a flower or a tree and wondered what it was?


If you nodded your head as you read that, then SCLT has a new way to help you connect with the land and natural history of our home.
